- 1 The average weight of Corgis is between 25 to 30 pounds for males and 11 to 14 pounds for females. The peril you need to look out for is that Corgis gain weight very easily which can lead to health issues later on.



- 2 **STATURE**  
The height of an adult Corgi ranges between 10 and 13 inches both for males and females.

## COAT

- 3 This breed has a short to medium length coat that has a thick undercoat with a longer and fluffier outer coat. Their undercoat is also water resistant. The coat is longer in the shoulders, neck and chest area.



- 4 **TEMPERAMENT**

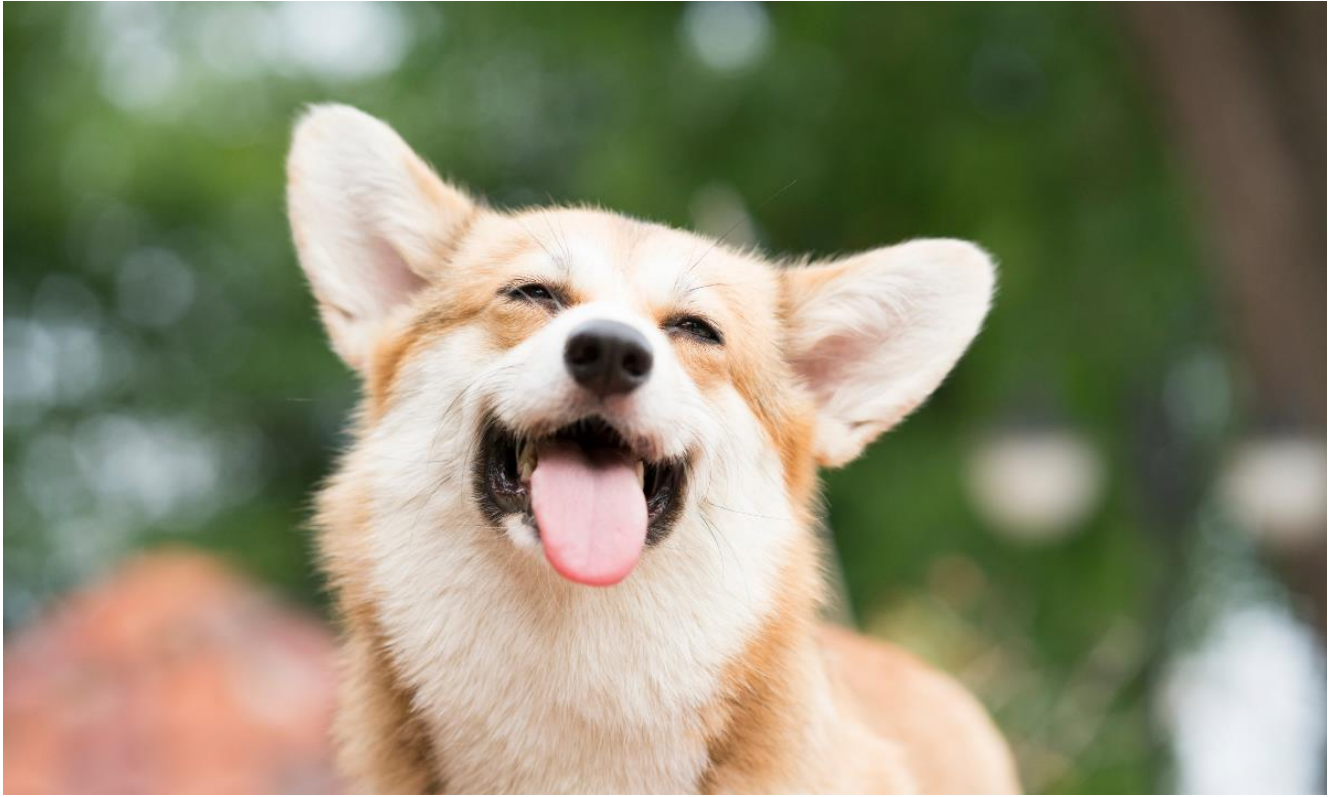

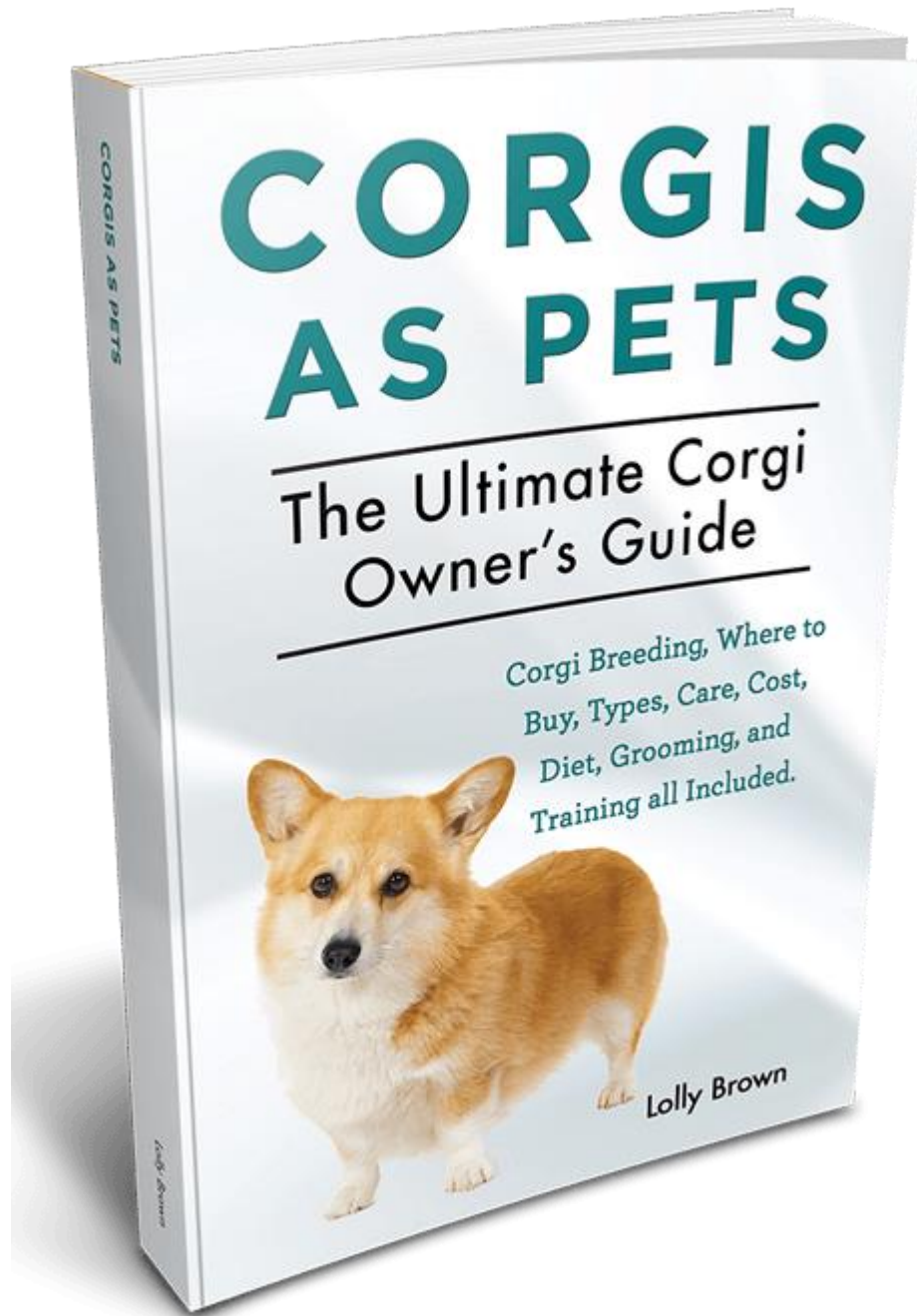
